

December 11, Wrampton townfoot 1815.

Dear Brother I have been expecting long to
to here from you it is betwixt four and
five years since we had a letter from you
it is nearly three since we had any from
Thomas anley tow we got this last summer
which we were happy to here you and your
Ladys was in good hillth and you had four
prety children George Thomas, John and
William. I understand Thomas has been trvelen
a good while last year purchesen Negers in
the north countrey and made som good
purches and he speaks of going to som other
part to purches som Land I wish it may be for
all your goods and you wish to becom a farmer
ferming is a poor busness in this Countrey at
this time every thing got quite low in this
part since peace take place nothing sels so
well as Wool it never was heigher I am winter^{ing}
about twelve hundred sheep this year I feed
betwixt three and four hundred Ewes and Lambs
at Townfoot every year. Malshill has been
devided this year but I onen thened it to Thomas
George is going to write to you but he has not
seen his Wolkles tow letters yet. he has not been
at home since the assises. he is serving his
time to an attorney with Mr Lightfoot at
Wigton but he has sent us a letter he will be at home

Tomorrow evening and then he will write to you
he has served near three years and he has now
to serve a year, it is not allowed by government for
Attorney to serve less than five years and it will
cost five hundred pounds to make an attorney
you will see what it is to be a scolar when he
writes to you, if you were to come back you would
scarce know malgate now the fire that you
saught from Longtown is higher than the Houses
the side all arched over and level and stone walls
on each side and planted and the road up the back
side of the House, now stone walls all round the
north side and on the east end and plantens the
old hedges all pulled down fine road to the raw
gate all these trees and hedges down and the road
just where the Tree was and it is waled with a stone
wall allong their and planted the raw bent hedges
is all down and we have streighted the march hedge
betwix us I have got a good deal of the raw field and
they have got a great deal of the raw bent and all
fine given hedges, I have no more room but I will
write you again and give you more full account of
myse. your sister nancy and her family is well
like wise your sister mary all other friends
is well your unkle Charles is alive but much faded
my Wife whom you know well has her kindest
respects to your Lady and you self we are all well
at present your well wishing Brother
